CONTEXT AND NATURE OF VISIT

- A. Purpose of Visit: The purpose of the visit is to conduct a Commission mandated focused visit on assessment of student academic achievement.
- B. Accreditation Status: West Virginia Northern Community College (WVNCC, Northern, or the College) is scheduled for its next comprehensive evaluation visit in 2012-2013. The institution has been continuously accredited since July, 1972 when it officially became WVNCC and accreditation was transferred from the Weirton and Wheeling campuses of West Liberty State College. The last comprehensive evaluation visit was conducted in March, 2003. The Self-Study Team recommended continued accreditation as well as a focused visit on assessment of student academic achievement for 2007-2008.
- C. Organizational Context: The College has undergone a number of significant changes since the last visit in 2003, especially in personnel changes. There have been a number of changes in College leadership and administrative structure, as well as at the divisional levels (e.g., four different CAO's in five years). The institutional effectiveness office was newly established in 2003 and since has evolved into the office of Institutional Research and Information Systems (IR/IS). The coordinator of assessment position has also changed since 2003 when it evolved from an administrative position, to a faculty person with release time to the current part-time assessment coordinator.
- D. Unique Aspects of Visit: The team visited the main campus at Wheeling. The chair of the team toured the campus at Weirton while driving to Wheeling.

II. AREA(S) OF FOCUS

The purpose of the mandated focused visit was on the assessment of student academic achievement. WVNCC must provide evidence of how the institution has met the following:

A-1. Statement of Focus:

- Consistent assessment of student learning outcomes across the College, regardless of location or modality.
- Implementation of assessment across the various levels, including courses, general education, degree programs/certificates, and institutional, and establish measures, indicators and specific benchmarks for acceptable levels of performance.
- Demonstrate that data collected is analyzed and used to improve subsequent instruction.
- Demonstrate that the analysis of assessment results is integrated with planning processes and is communicated to student, faculty, and administration.

B-1. Statements of Evidence

Evidence that demonstrates adequate progress in the area of focus.

Through discussions with members of the President's Cabinet, Program Directors and Department Chairs, faculty and a review of a variety of assessment documents (e.g., Master Course Guides {MCG}), there is adequate evidence to demonstrate that WVNCC maintains consistent assessment of student learning outcomes, regardless of location or modality.

There is clear evidence of the implementation of assessment across the various levels, including courses, degree programs/certificates, and institutional. WVNCC has also established direct and indirect measures and indicators for acceptable levels of performance. Examples of indirect measures were reviewed in the nursing department where an evaluation of leadership survey has been administered to nursing students; in microbiology surveys (on the MCG) have been administered asking students what they thought they learned as compared to quantitative scores of what students did actually learn; finally, the outcomes of an substance abuse course were changed because survey results revealed that the outcomes were creating educated consumers rather than creating the attitude to avoid the use of illegal drugs. The College has also used direct measures to determine student academic achievement; examples are the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) and a study of pass/drop out rates for selected mathematics courses.

There is clear evidence that data collected are analyzed and used to improve subsequent instruction. Through a review of completed Academic Assessment Reports, discussions with the members of the President's Cabinet, Assessment Committee, and faculty, there is compelling evidence that assessment, via course level assessment and program review, is in place, and used to make needed instructional improvements. In a meeting with program directors and division chairs, individuals shared both direct and indirect measures and analyses of those measures, which resulted in improvement to instruction. For example, based upon poor pass and retention rates in Math 96, the College reviewed and analyzed data, choosing to divide the one course into two subsequent courses. Retention and pass rates have increased due to this division. As a result of a local employer survey in the vocational/ technical area, the College modified curriculum and created intern programs.

Analysis of assessment results are integrated with the College strategic planning process and strategic plan. Specifically Goal Two of the 2006-2010 Strategic Plan addresses how the institution will "move assessment to the forefront of the College agenda and make everyone aware of the Institutional Effectiveness Plan." Goal One addresses how the College will "create and foster a culture in which all employees assume responsibility of placing needs of learners first." The origination of the strategic plan goals was the result of a formalized environmental scanning, analysis of enrollment, demographic, retention, and pass rate data generated by IR, as well as analysis of student learning results and the progress of the assessment plan. Representatives of students, faculty, staff, and administration were all involved in the development of the strategic plan.

 Evidence that demonstrates that further organizational attention is required in the area of focus,

Based upon the collection of evidence of student learning and discussions with various internal stakeholders (e.g., Assessment of General Education Task Force members and Assessment Committee members), WVNCC has made significant strides in the implementation of assessment across the various levels, courses, program/certificates, and institution, but there has not been the same level of implementation in the area of general education. In the last year, the General Education Task Force has been re-established and has developed general education core outcomes; however, there is not clear evidence the general education courses or program have been consistently and continually assessed. Many of the general education courses assessment reports are incomplete or are missing. The institution needs to develop a plan, implement the plan, determine measures and analyze those results, (e.g., a comprehensive assessment process) to ensure students are learning in the area of general education. Baseline performance benchmarks have been established in many technical and career programs, but not for general education. These benchmarks also need to be

established and incorporated into the comprehensive assessment process.

As noted in the Assurance section of this report, WVNCC has undergone significant personnel changes since the last comprehensive visit in 2003. These kinds of changes do not allow an organization to abide by consistent approaches or deployment of processes. The most noted area to suffer from neglected or inconsistent deployment has been the assessment of student academic achievement. The College now has stable and effective leadership in the president, will soon hire a permanent vice president of academic affairs, has hired an assessment coordinator familiar with the college and its culture, and has hired an institutional researcher skilled in data collection and analysis. Each of these developments has assisted the institution to move positively forward in eliminating the "fits and starts" of implementing an assessment plan. Taken as a collective, the College is poised to improve student learning.
